"Reflecting on Lent" — By Cathy Hohl

One day in early January, Pastor Delaney asked me to write the "lead" article for this newsletter and to focus on Lent. I'm not sure if she knew Lent is my favorite season of the church year, and I'm certain she didn't know I've always felt a little odd about that. Certainly there are cheerier seasons . . . the anticipation of Advent, the joy of Christmas, the celebratory days of Easter. Yet, for me, it's Lent.

Lent lets me dwell matter-of-factly in the reality that I live in an imperfect world - and I am part of that imperfection. It's personal. But this season of the church year also bring peace as it focuses on what will ultimately heal that brokenness. During worship, we sing wonderfully contemplative hymns that, through their poetry, guide me through the sad reality of my sin to the incredibly self-less Jesus who loved enough to heal me (and you) through his life, death, and resurrection.

In our hymnal, hymn numbers 319 through 359 are appointed for Lent and Holy Week. Here are excerpts from a few of my favorites:

Jesus, I will ponder now on your holy passion; let your Spirit now endow me for meditation. Grant that I in love and faith may the image cherish of your suffering, pain, and death, that I may not perish. (ELW 345)


My song is love unknown, my Savior's love to me, love to the loveless shown that they might lovely be. Oh, who am I that for my sake my Lord should take frail flesh and die? (ELW 343)

I heard the voice of Jesus say, "Come unto me and rest; lay down, O weary one, lay down your head upon my breast." I came to Jesus as I was, so weary, worn, and sad. I found in him a resting place, and he has made me glad. (ELW 332)

Your only Son, no sin to hide, but you have sent him from your side to walk upon this guilty sod and to become the Lamb of God. I was so lost, I should have died, but you have brought me to your side to be led by your staff and rod and to be called a lamb of God. (ELW 336)

During this Lenten season, I invite you to visit these Lenten hymns and let them draw you in. Let them lead you to peace in the midst of a broken world.

March is National National Kidney Awareness Month • March 11 is World Kidney Day

Chronic Kidney Disease (CKD) is a progressive condition in which kidneys don't work as well as they should to filter waste, toxins, and fluids from your body – which can cause serious health problems.

Kidney Disease Statistics:

37 million Americans have kidney disease.

Kidney disease is growing at an alarming rate. It currently affects more than 1 in 7 (15% of American adults).

Black Americans are 3.4 times more likely to develop kidney failure.

9 out of 10 people with kidney disease are unaware they have it.

Diabetes is the top cause of kidney failure. About 1 in 3 adults with diabetes have kidney disease.

Nearly 570,000 Americans are on dialysis.

Nearly 240,000 Americans are living with a kidney transplant.

The symptoms of kidney disease:

Symptoms may vary depending on what stage you are in, many people don't experience symptoms until the later stages when kidney failure occurs. It is beneficial to be aware of and look out for the following symptoms of early-stage kidney disease:

- High blood pressure
- Swelling in legs
- Foamy urine
- Frequent urination

- Swelling in hands/feet
- Weakness or fatigue
- Dry itchy skin
- Muscle cramps

<u>Diabetes</u> can lead to damaged or weakened blood vessels, preventing the kidneys from filtering waste and toxins from your blood.

<u>High blood pressure</u> can damage your blood vessels over time, including hardening and narrowing of arteries around the kidneys, preventing them from functioning as they should.

<u>Cardiovascular disease</u> can lead to narrow or blocked blood vessels, reducing the supply of oxygen-rich blood supplied to the kidneys, which may lead to kidney disease.

If you have a **family history** of kidney disease, you may be at higher risk for developing CKD.

Can early-stage kidney disease be reversed?

Unfortunately, most early-stage kidney disease cannot be reversed. However, taking action early to protect your kidney health can help you slow the progression of the disease. Take control of your health by making healthy lifestyle choices and speaking with your health care provider frequently to identify any changes in your health.

Good News!! On Saturday, April 5, 2025, Florissant and Midwest Recycling Center (MRC) will host an electronic recycling event - a perfect opportunity to get rid of broken and no longer used electronics.

MRC professionally recycles almost anything that uses a power cord or battery!

Acceptable items include, but are not limited to: Computers, Printers, Keyboards, Laptops, Hard Drives, Monitors*, Cell Phones, Pagers, Radios, Scanners, Speakers, VCRs, DVD Players, Fax Machines, Answering Machines, Televisions*, Stereos, Furnaces, Water Heaters, Air Conditioners*, Microwaves, Power Tools, Kitchen Appliances, Lawn and Garden Equipment**, etc.

*Fees may apply for Televisions, and some Computer Monitors and for devices containing Freon, such as Air Conditioners, Refrigerators, and Dehumidifiers.
